NEW SECURITY FEATURES FOR THE \$1,000 BANKNOTE

\$1,000 banknotes issued by The Hongkong and Shanghai Banking Corporation Limited (HSBC) with the date 1 September 2000 carry three new security features. These features are additional to the existing security features, and will further deter counterfeiting. HSBC \$1,000 banknotes with these new features will be available towards the end of December 2000.

HOLOGRAPHIC WINDOWED THREAD

- A vertical shiny metal thread, 3mm wide, is woven into the paper.
- Holographic images of the bauhinia flower and '1000' appear on the thread.
- When the thread is held against the light, 'HK1000' and the bauhinia flower appear in cleartext.

EXISTING SECURITY FEATURES

Intaglio printing: giving an embossed feel.
Asymmetrical serial number: printed both horizontally and vertically.
Fluorescent denomination blocks: visible under ultraviolet light, now reduced from 4 t
Security thread: visible from both sides, now moved to the left.
Watermark: can be viewed against the light on both sides.
Concealed denomination: visible when the note is tilted.
See-through patterns: exactly aligned on both sides.

EMBEDDED FLUORESCENT FIBRES

Red, blue and green fibres randomly embedded in the paper show up under ultraviolet light.

HIGHLIGHT WATERMARK

A very bright watermark, showing the number 1000 when the note is held against the light.





Is the existing HSBC \$1,000 banknote still legal tender?

Yes.

Will new security features be applied to the \$1,000 banknotes of the Bank of China and Standard Chartered Bank as well?

The two banks are preparing to incorporate suitable new security features into their \$1,000 banknotes.

Will new security features be applied to banknotes of other denominations?

A review of the design and security features for all of Hong Kong's banknotes is now in progress. A decision on the security features for banknotes of other denominations will be taken as part of this review.

What should I do if I think that a banknote may be counterfeit?

Retain the banknote and take it to the nearest police station as soon as possible. Alternatively, call the Commercial Crime Bureau at 2860 5012 or 2860 5013.
