NEW SECURITY FEATURES FOR THE \$1,000 BANKNOTE

Three new security features have been added to the \$1,000 banknotes issued by Hong Kong's three note-issuing banks:


- for the Bank of China (BOC), on notes dated 1 January 2001 onwards
- for The Hongkong and Shanghai Banking Corporation Limited (HSBC), on notes dated 1 September 2000 onwards
- for the Standard Chartered Bank (SCB), on notes dated 1 January 2001 onwards

NEW SECURITY FEATURES HSBC A Holographic windowed thread • A vertical shiny metal thread, 3mm wide, is woven into the paper. • Holographic images of the bauhinia flower. and '1000' appear on the thread. • When the thread is held against the light, 'HK1000' and the bauhinia flower appear in cleartext. **B** Embedded fluorescent fibres Red, blue and green fibres randomly embedded in Z06150 the paper show up under ultraviolet light. Highlight watermark A very bright watermark, showing the number 1000 when the note is held against the light. **EXISTING SECURITY FEATURES**


- **1** Intaglio printing: giving an embossed feel.
- **2** Serial number: printed on the left and right sides of the banknotes.
- **3** Two fluorescent denomination blocks: visible under ultraviolet light.
- **4** Security thread: visible from both sides.
- **5** Watermark: can be viewed against the light on both sides.
- **6** Concealed denomination: visible when the note is tilted.
- **7** See-through patterns: exactly aligned on both sides.

Are the existing \$1,000 banknotes of the three note-issuing banks still legal tender?

Yes.

Will new security features be applied to banknotes of other denominations?

A review of the design and security features for all of Hong Kong's banknotes is now in progress. A decision on the security features for banknotes of other denominations will be taken as part of this review.
